# CAMP SPIRITO, IJ FRIENDS ARE FRIENDS FOR LIFE, WELCOMING SECONDARY ONES TO THE IJ FAMILY

The success of Camp Spirito stems from the fact that it is run by student leaders and SJC teachers with the aid of alumni who return batch after batch to celebrate IJ memories of camaraderie.

Camp Spirito inducts the Secondary Ones into the IJ Family. The Secondary Ones learnt about the values of the IJ schools, and the challenges that our founders experienced in establishing these schools for the girls. Against this backdrop, they learnt further about the history of Singapore through the Singapore River Trail. Through this camp, our Secondary Ones heard from alumni, learnt more about the school, as well as the importance of time management and having a positive attitude. New ties with classmates were also forged through team-building challenges, together with the lessons of perseverance, communication and love.

### CAMP CHALLENGE - PUSHING BOUNDARIES, EMERGING FROM COMFORT ZONES

The Secondary Two Level Camp challenged students to get out of their comfort zone to explore different careers so that they can use this knowledge to select suitable subjects during their streaming at the end of the year. During the three-day camp, Secondary Twos visited Singapore Zoo to gain knowledge of careers through behind-the-scenes tours and Kidzania to learn more about different careers in a stimulated environment. Through the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) workshop carried out by the UN Women Singapore Committee and the Social Work Careers Talk, our students learnt more about the STEM industry and possible careers related to Social Work.

Students were engaged in thoughtfully designed games that placed them in the shoes of the elderly or persons with special needs so that they could better understand the challenges of aging or having various forms of disabilities. The games and scheduled bonding time with Form Teachers also gave teachers and students many opportunities to strengthen teacher-student relationships within each class.

Teachers found it heartening to witness their most timid and quiet students step out of their comfort zones to make a difference in the lives of others and together as a class, deliver what they had set out to do. Of course, not all classes were able to carry out their programme exactly as they had planned, however, the lesson learnt was clear: it was the process, and not the programme, that was of value.

The service learning was an amazing experience. I learnt a lot like the different types of difficulties the elderly face. Even though not all things turned out the way we planned, we managed to make the service learning

## CAMP ASPIRATIONS, SHAPING POST-SECONDARY DREAMS



Building Resilience, Confronting challenges Through Rock-Climbing

Sec 4 level camp 2018 was organized to prepare students mentally and collaboratively for the journey towards the N and O Levels. Using the authentic experience of rock-climbing as a metaphor for the journey that candidates will take towards attaining their academic goals at the national examinations, all classes had a chance to experience the excitement as well as the trepidation of rock-climbing. As some of their teachers climbed with them, especially those who had not ever tried rock-climbing before, students were visibly touched that their teachers were there to experience the challenge with them and this deepened the student-teacher bond. As a student observed, "Climbing up is like how we reach towards our N levels, not to give up." (Siti Natasha, 4A)

Following that, students had a chance to visit the Supreme Court where they learnt about Singapore's judicial system and had a chance to sit in a courtroom that was not in session. Students witnessed a simulated court hearing to listen to stories about the history of our judiciary system and to understand the importance of upholding a fair and just system in the development of a country.

The camp ended with students exploring personal branding with their teachers, and visiting the various polytechnic open houses where they had a chance to interact with polytechnic students from the different academic programmes, PFP, DPP and post-O-levels, to understand the different opportunities available to them via the polytechnic routes. They learnt about internships, holistic leadership programmes and career development chances available to polytechnic students. At the different polytechnics, students had a chance to reunite with their SJC seniors who were amongst the guides who brought them all around the different campuses.



Secondary 4NT students had the additional opportunity of staying overnight at the Fairmont after a day of observing the professional work of staff-members from the housekeeping, food and beverage, marketing and front of house service desks. They shared that while "individuals contribute to the building of a successful story, just like how the chambermaid, managers and restaurant chefs have a role to play in creating a beautiful hotel stay for the guest, the success of a class is dependent on the individuals in the class too." (Class of 4A).

Further differentiation took place with a group of Secondary Fives attending a workshop at *Dialogue in the Dark* where they were tasked to complete various team activities in a dark exhibit. Having experienced the challenge of carrying out tasks in total darkness, all the girls left that afternoon inspired by how the blind can continue to led full lives without their sight. Many could relate to the fact that a society requires empathy to move and saw how they each need to be critical supports to one another in their journey towards the national examinations. The visit to The Future World at Art Science Museum also enabled the Secondary Fives to see how the power of technology has to be well-harnessed if it is not to be detrimental to mankind. Many of them shared that they are humbled yet excited by

how their lives could be so different in the future as they saw for themselves how the exhibit featured how technology has altered our notions of what constitutes reality.

During the post-activity debrief sessions with form teachers, Secondary Fours shared that the workshops made them "understand the right attitude I should have in order to achieve my goals", "how personal branding could set us differently from others and become our selling point". (Class 4D)



As a follow-up to the Sec 4 and 5 level camp, the upper secondary Parent-Teacher Meeting on Friday, 2 February, 7 to 9pm, will feature talks by speakers from NUS, SMU, our affiliated JC, Catholic Junior College, Nanyang Polytechnic, and ITE (Central), alongside talks by our various department Heads (Mathematics, Science, Humanities).
